1.	ANGOLA	<p>Published 11.03.2020</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) All PoEs closed on 20th March for 15 days 2) Passengers and airline crew who arrive from or have been in China (People's Rep.), Iran, Italy or Korea (Rep.) are not allowed to enter Angola. This does not apply to airline crew and nationals of Angola. 3) Residents of Angola, airline crew and nationals of Angola who arrive from or have been in China (People's Rep.), Iran, Italy or Korea (Rep.) will be put in quarantine. 4) A completed sanitary control sheet must be presented to the National Directorate of Public Health of the Ministry of Health upon arrival.
2.	BOTSWANA	<p>Published 19.03.2020</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Passengers arriving from Austria, Belgium, China (People's Rep.), Denmark, France, Germany, India, Iran, Italy, Japan, Korea (Rep.), Netherlands, Norway, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, USA or United Kingdom are not allowed to enter Botswana. This does not apply to nationals of Botswana. This does not apply to passengers who reside in Botswana. 2) Nationals and residents of Botswana will be quarantined for 14 days. 3) Passengers can no longer obtain a visa on arrival in Botswana.. 4) Visas issued to nationals of Austria, Belgium, China (People's Rep.), Denmark, France, Germany, India, Iran, Italy, Japan, Korea (Rep.), Netherlands, Norway, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland or USA are invalidated. 5) Visas issued to passengers with a British passport with nationality "British Citizen" are invalidated.
3.	BURUNDI	<p>Published 21.3.20</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Burundi suspends all flights, screens returnees and visitors for Covid-19. All travellers with travel history to Australia, China, the EU, Iran, Japan, South Korea and the US in the 14 days prior to arrival will be quarantined for 14 days. 2) Border with Rwanda closed on 15 March (Ruhwa crossing) for travellers from Rwanda independent of nationality. 3) Brussels Airlines and RwandAir have suspended flights to/from the country.

5.	COMOROS ISLANDS	<p>Published 17.02.2020</p> <p>International restrictions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Passengers arriving from or having transited through China or Japan face a potential entry ban or quarantine upon arrival. 2) A mandatory 14-day quarantine is in place for travellers from affected countries. 3) Travellers from counties with confirmed cases of COVID-19 may be required to have spent a period of 14 days in quarantine in a country that is free from COVID-19. 4) AB aviation has suspended all flights to/from Mayotte.
6.	ETHIOPIA	<p>Published 21-03-20</p> <p>International restriction:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Ethiopian airlines has suspended travel to 30 countries (but not on which routes). 2) All incoming travelers are subject to a 14-day quarantine at designated hotels at their own cost. 3) All incoming travelers after 00:10, 23 March will undergo a mandatory quarantine at the Ethiopian Skylight Hotel for 14 days at the passenger expense. 4) Diplomats will be quarantined at their respective Embassies. 5) The 14-day quarantine does not apply to transit passengers. 6) Transit Passengers holding connecting flight bookings will stay at the Ethiopian Skylight Hotel until their connecting flight. <p>Internal restriction:</p> <p>All large public gatherings and sporting events have been suspended until at least 29 March. Schools will also remain closed in this time period</p>
7.	ESWATINI	<p>Published 23-03-20</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Foreign nationals from high-risk countries would not be allowed to enter Eswatini until further notice. Visas already issued to residents of those countries are revoked as of 20 March.
8.	ERITREA	<p>Published 16-3-20</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Eritrea implements quarantine measures for travelers who visited China, South Korea, and Italy due to COVID-19 outbreak March 3; further spread of the virus expected. 2) Banned Eritreans from all forms of internal and foreign travels except for "extremely urgent and unavoidable purposes.

		3) Every person must avoid, as much as possible, public gathering.
9.	KENYA	<p>Updated 18.03.2020</p> <p>International restrictions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Kenya will suspend all incoming and outgoing international passenger flights from 00.00, 25 March until further notice. Cargo flights will be operational • All travellers coming into the country before 25 March will have to go through quarantine at a government-designated facility at their own expense. • Kenya on 15 March issued an entry ban on all travellers coming from countries with reported COVID-19 cases. There are exemptions for Kenyan citizens as well as foreigners with valid residence visas as long as they go through self-quarantine. This travel ban will come into effect within 48 hours of announcement and will last for 30 days. • All travellers who have entered Kenya in the last 14 days will need to self-quarantine. • All flights from China have been suspended until further notice. • All international meetings and conferences have been banned for 30 days during March. <p>Internal restrictions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The governor of Murang'a county has banned incoming travellers from other counties
10.	LESOTHO	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Visitors to Lesotho must travel or transit via South Africa. South Africa has put in place travel restrictions on individuals from countries affected by coronavirus, including the United Kingdom. A number of the border crossing points between South Africa and Lesotho have been closed including the crossing points at Tele Bridge, Peka Bridge and Sani Pass 2) All individuals who have been in coronavirus affected areas within the past 14 days, including the UK, are required to self-isolate for 14 days.
11.	MADAGASCAR	<p>Published 20-03-20</p> <p>International restrictions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) All international and regional flights have been suspended from 20 March for a period of 30 days. 2) All foreign travellers who have been to Italy, South Korea, China and Iran within 14 days prior to arrival in the country continue to be denied entry. The restrictions don't apply to permanent residents. 3) All international flights, regardless of origin, are currently landing at the capital Antananarivo's Ivato International

12.	MALAWI:	<p>1) Screening of all travels instituted at the PoE and assessment travelers with symptoms will be done by the health official</p> <p>2) Self- quarantine of all asymptomatic travelers arriving in Malawi with follow-up by health authorities for 14 days</p>
13.	MAURITIUS	<p>-Updated 19.03.2020</p> <p>International restrictions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Mauritius will go into lockdown for two weeks from 06.00 hrs 20 March. No inbound travel (except for flights by Air Mauritius on 21 March from India, Johannesburg, and London for Mauritius nationals ONLY). Outbound travels options are still operational. Borders will be closed to all nationals and foreigners; transit will not be allowed. Passengers on the Mauritius-Rodrigues route are exempt from this restriction. All travellers who have been in China, including Hong Kong (China SAR) and Macao (China SAR), within the last 14 days will be denied entry. All travellers who have transited China, including Hong Kong and Macao, in the 15 days prior to arrival will be quarantined. Travellers from South Korea and Lombardy, Veneto and Emilia-Romagna regions (all Italy) will be denied entry. Citizens and their immediate family members will be granted entry, but required to undergo quarantine. Passengers arriving from Auvergne-Rhone-Alpes, Hauts-de-France and Ile-de-France regions (all France) will be subject to increased scrutiny and quarantined if they exhibit symptoms of COVID-19.
14.	MOZAMBIQUE	<p>International restrictions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Visa issuance has been suspended and all visas previously issued will be cancelled.

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> All incoming travellers, including local nationals will be subject to mandatory 14-day self-quarantine. <p>Internal restrictions:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Those who are placed in self-quarantine will be assessed by a health ministry team. If they develop symptoms and test positive for COVID-19, they will be required to move to a health facility.
15.	NAMIBIA:	<p>Published - 18 March 2020</p> <p>Suspension of issuance of visa on arrival and travel ban of foreign nationals by air and sea from the following countries China, U.K, US, Iran, Korea, Japan and Schengen countries</p> <p>International restrictions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Travellers who are considered high-risk for COVID-19 due to symptoms and recent exposure in a country with active transmission may be taken to an isolation facility for treatment. For travellers who have been in China in the previous 14 days who do not have symptoms, 14 days of self-quarantine is being recommended by the Government of the Republic of Namibia. 2) Suspended visa on arrival for foreign nationals arriving from China, Iran, Japan, Schengen Area countries, ,South Korea, the UK and the US. 3) Temporary travel suspension for 30 days for Namibians and Permanent Residents except for special cases with prior authorisation from the Ministry of Health and Social Services and Home Affairs and Immigration. <p>Internal restrictions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) State of emergency declared in Namibia , with effect from 17 March 2) All large gatherings are banned. 3) Schools are closed for 30 days.
16.	RWANDA	<p>International restrictions: Updated 21 March 2020</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) The country closed all its borders except for goods, cargo and returning citizens and permanent residents, who will have to undergo a 14-day quarantine at designated locations upon their return. 2) All travellers from one of the countries in which cases of infection with the virus have been recorded, will be registered and subjected to a daily monitoring for 14 days (calculated from the date of departure from one of the countries with contagion cases. All travellers from one of the countries in which cases of infection with the virus have been recorded, who present symptoms will undergo quarantine. 3) Rwandair has suspended flights with Israel, China and India. 4) All commercial inbound and outbound flights, including with RwandaAir, will be suspended from 23.59 on 20 March for a period of 30 days. Cargo and emergency flights will continue to operate normally.

SOUTH AFRICA	<p>Published 18.03.2020</p> <p>International restrictions:</p> <p>1) South Africa: The country declared a state of emergency on 15 March with a package of restrictions which include:</p> <p>2) From 16 March, 35 land borders out of 53 as well as two sea ports out of 8 will be closed.</p> <p>3) The visa requirement includes a certificate to indicate that travellers have undergone a test showing they are free of COVID-19.</p> <p>4) South Africans who have dual citizenship might not be allowed back into South Africa upon their return.</p> <p>5) South African Airways suspends all international and regional flights till 31 May.</p>

		<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 6) From 15 March, visas will not be issued for nationals from China, Germany, Iran, Italy, South Korea, Spain, the UK and the US. Visas already obtained before the announcement of the state of emergency will also be revoked 7) All foreign nationalities who have been to China, Germany, Iran, Italy, South Korea, Spain, the UK and the US in the past 20 days will be denied visas. Visas already issued to travellers from these countries will be revoked. 8) From 18 March, a travel ban will be imposed on nationals from the above-mentioned countries. 9) All foreign travellers who have entered South Africa from these high-risk countries since mid-February will be required to be tested for COVID-19. 10) South Africans who return from China, Germany, Iran, Italy, South Korea, Spain, the UK and the US will have to go through tests and self-isolate or quarantine upon returning. 11) Travellers from medium-risk countries including Hong Kong, Portugal and Singapore will be subject to high-intensity screening, though the authorities have not specified what the screening consists of. Travellers from medium-risk countries will need to apply for visas.
20.	SOUTH SUDAN	<p>International restrictions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Travellers who have been to China in the past 14 days but who do not meet the definition of a COVID-19 suspect case or contact will have home-based self-monitoring with daily phone calls from public health officers, with the recommendations to remain at home, avoid large gatherings, and practice social distancing. 2) Flights to affected countries are temporarily suspended, including Algeria, China, Egypt, Iran, Italy, Japan, South Korea, Togo, Tunisia, UAE and the US, among other affected countries
21.	TANZANIA	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Screening measures are in place at airports for all passengers arriving into Tanzania's three international airports at Dar es Salaam, Kilimanjaro and Zanzibar. Travelers are required to provide personal details and be subject to a temperature check. Those showing symptoms of COVID-19 will be isolated at the airport and may subsequently be placed in quarantine in a government hospital. 2) The Tanzanian government has recommended travelers coming from high-risk countries to go through a self-imposed 14-day isolation; the list of high-risk countries are however not specified by the government. 3) The Zanzibar authorities on 21 March announced that they would suspend all incoming commercial flights, except for charter flights, to the island of Zanzibar. Those who enter the island are subject to a 14-day quarantine at their own costs.

22.	ZAMBIA	<p>Published 16 March 2019</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> 1) The Government of Zambia has been closely monitoring the evolution of the COVID-19 outbreak, now declared a pandemic by the World Health Organization. To prevent the transmission and spread of COVID-19 in Zambia, the Government of Zambia in line with the Public Health Act 2013 is implementing the following measures 2) All individuals coming to Zambia from the following high-risk countries will not be allowed entry; 3) China, Japan, South Korea, Iran, USA, UK Austria, Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, Italy, Netherlands, Norway, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland and India. 4) Zambians and residents returning from high risk countries will be subjected to 14-day mandatory quarantine as per protocol 5) Issuance of Visa at Ports of entry and at all Embassies is suspended with immediate effect. Current visas are cancelled with immediate effect until further notice. 6) International travel by all Government employees except for the His Excellency President Dr Edgar Chagwa Lungu, parastatals and State Owned Entities is suspended with immediate effect. 7) Social Distancing (public gatherings) <p>Total suspension of public gatherings of more than 50 people immediately for 30 days, these include;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Religious activities b. Sporting events c. Conferences d. Wedding celebrations e. Night clubs/bars f. Music concerts g. Parties h. Gymnasiums <p>The public is also advised to maintain a distance of 1-2 meters between individual persons and maximum of 50 individuals everywhere including the following places;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Banks b. Restaurants including take out restaurants c. Supermarkets/shops d. Pharmacies e. Post Offices f. Government service departments (road transport, immigration, civil registration, police stations, etc.) g. Funerals.

		<p>To ensure continued safety of other users of health facilities, individuals who have cold symptoms (cough, fever, sore throat) and have had contact with returning travelers should;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Not use public transport - If using private vehicle or on foot, should alert health facility officers on arrival before entering facility <p>To minimize risk of contracting and possible spreading of COVID-19, members of the public are advised to post-pone non-essential local travel.</p> <p>To ensure continued safety of mourners/public at funerals/memorial services;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Funerals should be brief and are to last no more than 2 hours. - Ensure easy access to hand cleaning with water and soap - During burial, strict hand washing/surface cleaning is recommended for all equipment used (shovels, microphones, etc.) - To further minimize risk, no food service shall be provided to the public/mourners <p>All citizens and residents of Zambia are to postpone travel to affected countries to minimize the risk of COVID-19. 23.	ZIMBABWE	<p>International restrictions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Travellers arriving from countries with confirmed COVID-19 cases will be subject to medical screening upon arrival. Travellers arriving from countries with local transmission cases (as referenced by the WHO) are advised to self-quarantine for a period of 21 days. 2) Travellers with signs and symptoms of COVID-19 will be subject to immediate isolation at a medical facility upon arrival. 3) All travellers should obtain a medical certificate proving that they are clear of COVID-19 prior to travel to Zimbabwe; there is potential, based on a passenger’s nationality and recent travel history, that they may be asked at immigration to produce such a certificate in order to be granted entry. Anecdotal evidence suggests that passengers arriving from countries without confirmed COVID-19 cases or a “low” number of cases will not be required to present a certificate, however the authorities have not produced a specific list. Furthermore, authorities have asked travellers who have recently been to or are arriving from countries such as China, Iran, Italy and South Korea, to suspend travel to Zimbabwe, as they are likely to be refused entry. For profile and itinerary-specific information, travellers are advised to contact the relevant airline, or the nearest Zimbabwean Embassy. 4) President Mnangagwa announced COVID-19 as a ‘National Disaster;’ this allows authorities to deploy resources in combatting the pandemic and also allows the government to forbid gatherings exceeding 100 people.
